### Sarah Thistlethwayte

1938 - 2022

Sarah was actively involved in the local community for 59 years, having arrived aged 25. The youngest of four children, she grew up in Norfolk. She attended The Royal College of Music but didn't finish her diploma because she married Peter aged 19. Together they bought East Donyland Hall in 1963, with farmland stretching down to the



river. Sarah had three children, seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. As a local fundraiser and people-person, her fun and anticipated annual Garden Open Day was just one example of her typical commitment to the village. She was a glamorous hostess able to draw on her large social networks in the arts and open her house to raise funds for local charities.

She had an excellent memory and wide knowledge of Parish affairs, Council structures, functions and planning rules. She successfully fought to maintain the Colne River public footpath against Colchester Dock Transit Company's development. She was instrumental in conserving significant SSRI woodland on the edge of Rowhedge.

Sarah stood on the St Andrew's Parochial Church Committee in Fingringhoe and was actively involved with the school. She delivered meals on wheels locally and was secretary of The Rowhedge Protection Group. Though never published, she researched and wrote two books, the latter a modern-day interpretation of the New Testament gospels.

As one local friend wrote 'she was so very kind, gentle, generous and amusing and extremely welcoming to me. She always sounded as though she was pleased to talk to me and took the time to listen'.

# Community Winter Warmth and Welcome Spaces Fund opens for applications

Essex County Council has launched its Community Winter Warmth and Welcome Spaces Fund of £100,000, which offers grants of up to £1,000 so that organisations can create new spaces or activities, or extend their existing services. The fund is open to charities, clubs or associations, community interest companies and parish councils. It has been designed to support safe spaces which are free to the Essex public this winter and could offer residents things to do, advice, warmth or support for their physical and mental health. Grants can be used for things like equipment to run new

activities, venue or catering costs, operational costs including utilities, and staff or volunteer expenditure. The fund forms part of Essex County Council's Cost of Living Support for Households and Communities Plan, a £50m package of support through which ECC brings together partners, charities and organisations to tackle the issues residents are facing. # Update from the Parish Council

Play area The good news is that the Council have been granted £500 from Councillor Kevin Bentley's Locality budget towards a new surface under the cantilever swing, which is now on order and will be fitted shortly. The bad news is that one evening in late October, some vandals pulled out the new bench seats and if that wasn't enough, they put them on the little slide, causing further damage. The incident has been reported to the police but is such a shame after the effort and funds put into this and the lovely comments we have had. As a result of this and other damage in the car park, the Council have agreed to install CCTV. Meanwhile, we continue to inspect and maintain the area for the enjoyment of our residents and visitors and are in the process of renewing the lease for another 10 years, courtesy of the Lennon family.

Wilder Towns, Wilder Villages This is an Essex Wildlife Trust initiative to which the Council have signed up. **Tree survey** All the trees on land owned and maintained by the Council have been professionally surveyed and reported on and all recommendations have now been carried out. The survey is a regular requirement of the Council, which ensures the trees are healthy and well-managed.

**20's Plenty for Us** As mentioned in the previous edition, with support from Essex County Council and Councillor Kevin Bentley, the Council have agreed to look into the benefits of adopting this speed limit in some parts of the village. **Fire Beacon, Ferry Road** A brass plaque detailing the reason for the beacon has been made, for visitors and future generations to see. This will be fitted in the next few weeks.

**John Brunning Walk** The Council were pleased to make a small donation towards new signage for the John Brunning Walk which runs between Fingringhoe and Rowhedge.

**Pigs Foot Green posts** We are looking at replacing the posts around the green as some of them have been damaged by passing/turning vehicles and others are rotten and loose. Work is unlikely to start until the new year.

**Jubilee mugs** There are still quite a few mugs left with the incorrect spelling of Fingringhoe. If you would like some, please call at the Post Office to collect them.

Road signs We have been in contact with Essex County Council Highways several times to report broken, missing or new signage needed in the village. If you spot anything new that needs to be reported, please use the ECC reporting tool on their website: www.essexhighways.org/tell-us With the help of Councillor Robert Davidson, we hope to arrange for a Highways engineer to visit the village to look at the work needed, some of which the Council may pay for, just to get it done and help to improve safety.

**Council meetings** We meet on the first Tuesday of each month (apart from August) at 7pm at the village hall. The public are welcome to attend and speak during the public session. ## Church Green Trust Activities

Following the Jubilee Craft Fair held at Church Green Trust Community Courtyard earlier this year it became apparent that many people were not aware of the Trust or the facilities it offers. The Trust was established in 1981, when land and buildings were gifted to the village to provide accommodation for older people and provide community facilities. There are two areas: the residential part which has six individual independent-living homes for the over 60s and the community facilities of the Courtyard area (through the gate, beyond the car park) which include the cart lodges, an artist's studio and the Community Room.

The mobile Post Office comes to the village on Monday (10am–1pm), Wednesday (1–4pm) and Friday (10am–1pm). and is housed in the Courtyard Community Room. During post office opening times on a Monday & Friday, volunteers serve coffee and biscuits – everyone is welcome and this has proved to be an excellent venue for meeting people and catching up with friends – come in and enjoy a cuppa!

Knit and Natter meets in the Community Room on the last Friday of each month (1.30–3.30pm). This group is open to everyone and you can bring whatever craft you like – knitting, sewing, crotchet etc, or you can just come for a natter. Tea, coffee and biscuits or cake are provided all for a donation of £1. You can just turn up or phone Jill Bellinger for more details on 07947 495264.

**Book/puzzles exchange:** if you enjoy a good book or love puzzles, you can find a wide variety of both in the Community Room, either to take for a small donation or to exchange. There are also various local crafts on show to purchase. You are welcome to browse at any time during post office hours.

**Plant exchange:** outside the Community Room there is a fresh produce and plant stand where surplus locally grown plants/vegetables/fruit can be left by village residents for others to take or exchange.

**Recycling facility:** Fingringhoe Green Group has installed recycling bins in one of the Courtyard cart lodges near to the Community Room.

A Book Club is held in the residents' communal lounge on the third Monday of the month at 2pm. All are welcome so if you are interested in joining, please contact Ann Bagley on 01206 729560 for details.

Other one-off events have been held here recently including the Green Group 2022 Calendar-voting coffee morning, the Jubilee craft fair and two Bike Kitchens. Looking ahead, the newly-formed Friends of Church Green Trust would like to see more activities within the Community Courtyard and would be pleased to hear from anyone interested in running events or groups. We also hope to have projects within the grounds of Church Green particularly concerned with supporting wildlife and native planting.

Almost a hundred children, and a team of dedicated teaching staff and families throughout our community rely on a strong and functioning board of governors at Fingringhoe Church of England Primary School. Over the last few years, the school has faced a number of challenges, some unique, some universal to all schools. Governors work with the school to support it, guide it, and on certain matters administer it. It is an incredibly important voluntary role that most people know little about.

We are fortunate that a number of parents have come forward this year to fill roles that have become vacant, but we are looking for a few more individuals who have experience in governance, school administration or in some management or administrative role in the public or private sector. Our job covers policy, finance, monitoring, stability and the long-term direction of the school. We meet at least every term, with subcommittees meeting to tackle specific topics.

Perhaps you've recently retired from a management role, or stepped back from education but would like to dip a toe back in? People from a wide range of backgrounds can make a positive contribution. Perhaps the only caveat is that we do need people who are happy with emails and reviewing policy documents (it is not all about paperwork but this element makes the job easier).

If you've read this far, you've done well. Here is the best bit: when you go into the school and see these amazing small people, invariably happy, polite and caring, having fun, learning and growing up, you understand how important it is to ensure that the school is properly supported and well-managed. You understand that getting it right at the top level ensures that they continue to have somewhere wonderful to be educated. As governors, we undertake to visit the school and monitor it. These visits are a pleasure and it is a privilege to see the children in an environment that most of us outside education will never see and can only loosely recall from our earliest memories.

# From the Fingringhoe Historical Recorders


Item No. 5781: Silver cup, inscribed: Fingringhoe IMPS. Open Crooning Competition 1937. Winner R.B. Taylor

This is one of several silver cups in the Recorders' Archive, but while most record the achievements of members of the Women's Institute or the



Sunday School, this cup is for *crooning*, a style of singing seldom heard now. A context for this successful crooner is given by a handwritten note (item 5774) which reads 'Taylors came down from Durham(?) to build Abberton Reservoir, with families' (this construction was 1935-1939, which fits). Whether the Open Crooning Competition was local, or a much wider competition, it is striking that it took place in 1937, with the clouds of the second world war gathering. Even more intriguing, the cup was awarded by the Fingringhoe IMPS – not, it turns out, malicious little demons, but members of the Junior Imperial League, founded in 1906 by the Conservative Party to encourage political activity among the young (or perhaps to encourage them to marry each other, rather than dangerous socialists?). In time the IMPS became the Young Conservatives.

For many people, the rhythmic song of a nightingale and the soft purring of a turtle dove evoke happy childhood memories of long, lazy spring and summer days. However, these amazing birds are in serious trouble... **98%** of turtle doves and **92%** of nightingales have been lost in the UK since 1970. We are fortunate to still have strongholds of these incredible birds nearby, at Essex Wildlife Trust's Fingringhoe Wick and Wrabness nature reserves.

However, to ensure our wildlife has somewhere safe to shelter and thrive, our nature reserves must be beacons of hope for all wildlife, providing relief and refuge and vibrant mosaic habitats for wildlife to nest, forage and breed. # St Andrew's Church

Everyone here at St Andrew's sends *News & Views* readers a message of 'Peace and Goodwill' for Christmas. As the year draws to a close, the Parochial Church Council, as publisher of *News & Views*, wishes to express its sincere thanks to editor Lyn Rodley and all contributors for the continuing popularity and success of the magazine.

We also wish to express our appreciation to the dedicated team of volunteer distributors who deliver each issue to every household. Thank you, too, all readers who respond so generously to the occasional appeals for funds to meet the printing costs for each quarterly issue.

Collectively, your support re-affirms our belief in the value to the local community of a physical, hard-copy magazine at a time when the tide is increasingly flowing in favour of online-only publishing.

For St Andrew's and parishes throughout the Church of England, November and December are busy months. The Church marks its 'New Year', on Sunday November 27, the beginning of the season of Advent, which lasts until Christmas Day. What, you might be asking, is Advent?

Well, I can't improve on the description given in *Times and Seasons*, the Church of England's publication with resources for parishes to celebrate the Christian year. In this it is explained that Advent is a time 'of expectation and preparation, as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming *(adventus)* of Christ in his incarnation. It also looks ahead to his final advent as judge at the end of time.'

Here in the northern hemisphere, 'Advent falls at the darkest time of the year, and the natural symbols of darkness and light are powerfully at work thoroughout Advent and Christmas ... The lighting of candles on an Advent wreath was imported into Britain from northern Europe in the 19th century, and is now a common practice.' The Moravian custom of the Christingle has similarly enjoyed great success in Britain since the latter part of the 20th century, with the encouragement of the Children's Society.

As is customary, St Andrew's will mark the progress of the season by the lighting of five candles (four coloured, one white) – one on each of the four Sundays and the fifth on Christmas Day. In the Anglican liturgy each of the four Sundays remind us of those who prepared for the coming of Christ.

On the first Sunday, it is the Patriarchs, focusing on Abraham, our father in faith, and David, the ancestor in whose city Jesus was born. On the second Sunday, the Prophets, which gives us an opportunity to reflect on the way the birth of the Messiah was 'foretold'. On the third Sunday, John the Baptist, who proclaimed the Saviour. And on the fourth Sunday, the Virgin Mary, who bore him.

Finally, on Christmas Day, a white candle, to celebrate the Christ.
