

## Update from the Parish Council

The play area refurbishment has now been completed and we have received some lovely compliments about how it looks now. After the damage caused by Storm Eunice, we had to wait for the insurance claim to pay for a new multiplay unit and damage to the fence, which has now all been settled. We have also installed two new animal rockers, a see-saw and some new seating. All the existing equipment has been cleaned up and the surface levelled, and new play bark installed. There are ongoing tree works, as a few branches are overhanging, but this will be done in the next couple of weeks. We also await the outcome of a Locality Budget grant which would help pay towards renewing the surface under the cantilever swing.

New Councillor: the Council welcomed Neil Gordon back to the Council in May, which means we are now up to full complement with Councillors. We look forward to working with Neil and his previous knowledge and experience will be an asset to the Council

**Phone box**: some of you may have seen the Facebook post requesting help with building the shelves for the phone box book swap. 20 mph speed limit: the Council have supported a suggestion to have 20 mph speed limits within the village and Cllr Kevin Bentley has agreed to submit the proposal to the Local Highways Panel in the first instance, for a speed survey to collect the data needed to make the decisions.

Jubilee celebration: at the time of writing the June edition, the celebrations had not gone ahead but the events around the village were all so fantastic, that they all deserve a mention and a huge thanks to all the volunteers and supporters. It was a great achievement for such a small village and a weekend to remember. The Council are now looking at a plaque to go on the beacon, with the possibility of also adding a small residents' memorial space at the base for remembrance tributes, and another seat nearby. We hope you all liked the celebration mugs which caused the clerk a mild panic when they were

delivered with a spelling mistake, as the printers used the wrong proof. At the time of writing, there are still some mugs available with the incorrect spelling on, for collection from the Post Office, if you would like a couple for your household.



## The Thames at Fingringhoe

Until the 1970s, the Kesgrave sand and gravel deposits of north-east Essex, including those at Fingringhoe, were thought to be laid down by marine or glacial processes. It is now accepted that these deposits were a direct product of the proto-Thames drainage system. The river that became the modern Thames was diverted south to roughly its current position by the Anglian glaciation event (475-425,000 years ago), the last time a glaciation event reached north Essex. The hilly promontory on which Fingringhoe sits was the northernmost extent of the proto-Thames.

# Fingringhoe Wick Nature Reserve Reserve Reserve

I write this just as a little rain has started to fall — what a relief! However I imagine that the drought conditions will continue for a bit and drought obviously has severe impacts on our fish, rivers and streams. If you see dead fish, or fish struggling and gulping for air, please call the **Environment Agency hotline on 0800 807060.** Think also about the water we use at home, while our water comes mostly from reservoirs, this is extracted from rivers, so the less we use the better for our rivers systems.

After the Summer hols, September is all about the adult events, with a whole range of activities, including a Photography Workshop, Wader ID Course, the return of 'Migration Day' – where Essex Birdwatching Society and Swallow Birding spend the day with us. Very excitingly we have a new event – led by one of the exhibiting artists of the month, Lucia Hardy. She will be leading a Creative Walk: bring your sketchbook, camera, creative tools of choice, or just yourselves, and join us on a creative walk around the site as we get inspired by and connected to the beauty of the reserve. Lucia will facilitate a guided walk with stops using music, snippets of literature and art references to help you explore and enjoy the site anew in what promises to be an exciting and unique experience at Fingringhoe Wick.

Another first about which we are keen to sow the seed with you all is the **Fingringhoe Wick Memories Project**, in conjunction with the Fingringhoe Historical Recorders. We are joining up to record people's memories of visiting, working or anything else in relation to the nature reserve. So many people tell us about their fond memories, we would love to record them – they will be stored with the village archive and hopefully used at site in some way. We will launch this more formally later in the year, but watch this space for information on a day at Fingringhoe Wick when you can come in and speak to a Recorder. We would like to hear your own memories of visiting or working on the reserve, or those of friends or family who worked in the quarry. Before the drop-in day you can write things down to post or email over – and please spread to the word to people who have moved away.



Talking of seeds, from now until the end of October it is **The Big Wild Seed Sow**, which is all about helping insects to thrive again by providing

them with pesticide-free, insect-friendly habitat. This campaign is part of the wider Action for Insects project. Wildflowers provide insects with food, shelter and places to breed. More wildflowers need to be planted and areas of this insect-friendly habitat need to be connected by wildflower highways across residential and urban areas. To this end we have packets of wildflower seeds to give away: our irresistible wildflower mix is made from 100% native wildflowers. The 27 native British wildflower species include both cornfield annuals (flowering from year 1) and a range of perennials (flowering from year 2 onwards). So come along and grab a pack! ## Fingringhoe Historical Recorders' Archive

The Recorders are a group of Fingringhoe residents interested in the history of their village. Since its formation in 1981 the group has been building an archive of material about the people, topography, buildings, activities, industries and events of the village. This includes press cuttings, letters, photographs, posters, trophies, books, maps, drawings and personal accounts that have been donated by villagers over the years. For earlier history the archive also has photocopies of old documents now in the Essex Records Office in Chelmsford, such as census records and old newspapers. The archive is stored in Fingringhoe Village Hall.

In order to make this material accessible to anyone interested in the history of Fingringhoe the archive has now been catalogued on computer. Each of over 6,000 items has been numbered, described briefly and scanned or photographed. These files will be updated from time to time to include newly-gathered material.

The archive may borrowed in the form of a memory stick which has three files: Catalogue,

Images and Guide (the last file offering advice on searches). The files may be copied to your device if you wish, and the memory stick should be returned within two weeks of borrowing. A deposit of £10 is required for the loan, refundable on return of the memory stick (unless, of course, borrowers are able to leave the deposit as a donation to the Recorders' slender funds). ## Fingringhoe United Charities Trust

Fingringhoe United Charities Trust is a charity working in the village to help those in need. The Trust's funds are not limitless, but it supports those who fall on hard times, who find they need to travel because of illness or to take care of a loved one, and those bereaved and living alone. In the past, the Trust has supported people in training by providing tools and materials needed. Each Christmas, the Trust also gives a modest sum to all the single people in the village over statutory retirement age.

The Trust is run by Trustees, whose local knowledge is vital to ensure that those in need receive help when they need it most. Unfortunately, the Trust's current Treasurer /Secretary must resign, so a replacement is needed. Whoever takes on the role will be given training by the current Treasurer.

In addition to its charitable works, the Trust owns and manages the allotments on Ferry Road, together with the field behind them, and the Trustee who usually does this is also having to resign due to illness. A replacement Trustee, willing and able to take on responsibility for the allotments, is therefore also required. This will involve handling enquiries, keeping an eye on the allotments to ensure they are being kept responsibly, and taking annual rents.

Trustees generally meet in person twice a year – once in the summer and once in the run-up to Christmas. Between meetings, Trustees keep in contact via email to deal with matters arising, and extra ad hoc meetings are arranged if necessary. Trustees also deliver the Christmas gifts by hand around the village.
