




Historical Recorders of Fingringhoe

Update from the Parish Council

Recreation Ground Some of you might have seen that the deer fence (on the left as you drive into the car park) has been replaced in some areas and four *No Climbing* signs have been erected. The fence needed repairs not only due to natural deterioration but also because the fence has been climbed on and over and cannot take the weight or the strain. We have also repaired the play area fence in several places where the posts had started to rot. Thanks also to Cllr Kevin Bentley for £1,000 towards these costs from his Locality Fund.

It is vital that there are homes affordable to everyone in rural areas. Land values and house prices remain incredibly high and the gap between rural property prices and local wages continues to widen. Coupled with higher costs of living and rising energy prices, this leaves many unable to remain where they grew up or have support networks. As a result, earlier this year, Fingringhoe Parish Council worked with the RCCE's Rural Housing Enabler to carry out an independent Housing Needs Survey.

The aim of this survey was to determine the existing and future levels of housing need for local people in the parish. All households in the parish received a survey to complete and return, alongside the option to complete the survey online. Thank you to all residents who responded to this piece of work.

KEY FINDINGS

The survey had an excellent response rate of 41% (Essex average is 25%). There was good support (52%) for a small development (4 – 8 homes) which is primarily affordable housing for local people. There was general support for housing for the local community, more particularly the local younger generation and their families, whilst hoping that any development will not be too large and unsympathetic to its surroundings.

Sixteen households declared that family members had been forced to move out of the parish due to a lack of suitable accommodation in the parish. In Part 1 of the survey, 14 households (10%) indicated that they or someone in their household had a need to move to alternative accommodation within the next 5 years; of those, 15 wished to remain in the parish. The main reason respondents had a desire to move to alternative accommodation was to set up their first/independent home (33%) followed by those looking for a cheaper home (25%). Two-bedroom houses were the most preferred property size (83%).

Recommended local affordable housing need is therefore assessed at: 4 affordable rented properties; 2 sharedownership properties; 2 discounted market sale properties.

The information contained in the report will assist in assessing the viability and appropriateness of any schemes that may be proposed in the future to provide additional affordable housing in the village. Should any such proposals emerge then, as with all other planning applications, The Parish Council will keep residents fully informed.

John Brunning Walk The Council are very pleased that Essex County Council agreed to upgrade the section of the walk that was very wet and muddy and that the work has now been completed.



United Charities for the Poor, Fingringhoe The new trustees met last month, and the following positions were appointed/confirmed: Gerald Ketley – Chairman, Sharron Law – Treasurer, Ian Chamberlain – Allotments, Michael Clarke – Trustee, Derek Henderson – Trustee.

20mph speed limit Following an application to the Local Highways Panel (LHP) they carried out a Scheme Validation of request for a 20mph limit on Church Road, Fingringhoe.



Based upon speed data from an automatic traffic count (ATC), Church Road did meet the criteria for a new 20mph limit. The suggestion was that the first 600m length of Church Road (east of the crossroads) is progressed with a 20mph Speed Limit Order. The remainder of Church Road did not 'lend itself' to a 20mph limit and as such should remain as a 30mph. There is also limited highway available to install the required terminal signage for a 20mph limit.

As such the recommendation was for a Design Only commission in Year 1, and then Implementation in Year 2. The Design Phase would include the required Cabinet Member Action and Traffic Regulation Order. It would also produce a target cost for the Implementation. The estimated

cost for the Design Phase is £7,000 and this is a scheme on the Colchester LHP Schemes Awaiting Funding List, which would need a funding recommendation from the Panel to take it forward.

We also requested the 20mph Speed limit to include Abberton Road, Ferry Road, Brook Hall Road and Ballast Quay Road (including Frere Way, Frog Hall Close, Pyefleet Close) which are all Local Roads. On a Local Road a 20mph Speed limit can be considered if the mean speeds are lower than or equal to 24mph. There are no Traffic Survey records or speed/volume data from ATC's for these roads, and this is needed to asses any request for a 20mph limit. It would require an additional 7 ATCs to assess these roads and at this stage of the financial year the limited LHP Revenue Funding used for traffic surveys has been fully committed. They can if required add these ATCs to a list of traffic surveys to be carried out when funding permits, but realistically this could be a very long time as more urgent schemes come about.

Alternatively, it is possible for an external body, the Council, to fund the necessary ATCs. The cost for an externally funded ATC is £368.20 each or a total cost of £2,577.40. However, at the meeting on 5 November 2024, the Council decided not to go ahead with the extra ATCs at this stage but will be pursuing it for Church Road as explained above. More information will be published on the website as it arises.

Common Land Following on from the proposed sale of the sand works (J J Prior & Sons), the Council have been looking at the boundaries of the common land which the sand works surrounds. We have also met with one of the Wilder Community Rangers who provided an interesting report about the land and wildlife. You can view a copy of this report on our website, under 'News'.

Council meetings and information

We meet on the first Tuesday of each month (apart from August) at 7pm at the village hall. Members of the public are welcome to attend and speak during the public session. The agenda will be on the website and noticeboard a few days before each meeting.

Fingringhoe Wick Nature Discovery Park

The reserve is now in its winter period of change. Leaves are turning from green to rich yellows, browns and reds. Lots of fungi are popping up all over the site, including scarlet waxcaps, parasol, magpie ink cap and jelly ear fungus.

Winter is always a busy time of year for our volunteer team and Ranger. The paths are being cut back to open them up and create more light to the path edges, allowing a more diverse flower structure. We have started coppicing on the northern boundary. Coppicing is a traditional form of scrub and woodland management where the trees/scrub are cut at ground level on a predetermined year rotation. We cut out areas of the tall, leggy scrub or larger trees on a 11-14-year rotation depending on the size of plants. The immediate aim of this management is to allow light to penetrate to the ground to promote new plant growth, attracting invertebrates. After several years growth the scrub will be thick and dense enough to provide ideal habitat for small mammals, reptiles and songbirds, like the nightingale. We leave a few tall trees in the area, providing protected high treetops for other birds like blue tits, raptors and thrushes. Many landscapes across the UK are managed – there are few that are truly wild and untouched by human hand.

In December we welcome **Clive Stephen** to the exhibition area. Clive likes to recycle, reconstruct and rehome pictures and frames. Finding pictures and frames of interest from jumble sales, charity shops etc., he takes the 'ugly ducklings' apart and reassembles them in different frames as part of their transformation. Pop along in December to admire his work.



We have a few events running in December and January. Liz Huxley will be hosting a Duck I.D on 6 December – this has a few spaces left. A Ranger ramble on 8 December 10.30am-12 noon will be a great opportunity to have a walk around the reserve and ask any questions you have. We are hosting a Christmas centre-piece Floristry Workshop on 21 December 10am-12.30pm. This is at a slightly higher price of £40 but you will have a lovely centre-piece to take home that you have created. This event needs to be booked by 11 December to allow for supplies to be purchased. In January we are pleased to resume watercolours classes, the first one, on 15 January is Nature in Watercolours -Winter migratory birds 10am-12.30pm.
