
## **MARCH 2023**

## Fingringhoe Food Bank Donation Point

We have a very active foodbank in this region, based at Colchester. We collect donations of food, pet food and toiletries in the porch at St Andrew's ChurchFingringhoe; this is then transferred to Colchester Foodbank.

For the first time ever, food banks are giving out more food than is being donated. With the cost of living soaring, more people are being forced to use foodbanks. Across the UK, an emergency food bank



parcel is being given out every 13 seconds. In the Colchester region there has been a 47% increase in the number of people helped since the previous year.

Your donation will help the food bank to provide people facing financial hardship with food supplies and also information and advice to access the benefits and grants they're entitled to.



## Update from the Parish Council

Play area The Council have now appointed a new contractor to carry out the maintenance on the play area and the repairs will be carried out soon. Also, the goal posts on the recreation ground have been tidied up and will be painted when the weather is warmer, some of the car park posts have been replaced and we have opened the old container and are looking to empty it and possibly get it moved away. Following the vandalism at the play area, we have been working with the Community Policing Team who have been making regular visits to the area. The lease for the recreation ground has also been renewed for another 10 years to June 2032.

**20's Plenty for Us** As most of you will be aware, the paper petition was delivered to every household and was also available on our website, the deadline for responses was 28 February. Some of you have asked why only some of Fingringhoe has been included in the petition. The map provided shows only the possible extent of the 20-mph zone. **Pigs Foot Green posts** Work should be underway to replace the posts by the time of publication.

**Telephone box book swap** With the help of a local teenager, the telephone box has been turned in to a book swap which is proving popular with all age groups.

**Sand works verges** We have been looking into the ownership of these verges as there is often wild camping in these areas. We believe they are owned by Essex County Council, and we are working with Cllr Bentley to confirm this.

**Road signs** We have been in contact with Essex County Council Highways several times to report broken, missing or new signage needed in the village. If you spot anything new that needs to be reported, please use the ECC reporting tool on their website: www.essexhighways.org/tell-us and copy-in the clerk: fingringhoeparishc@outlook.com

We have also arranged a video call with ClIr Kevin Bentley and the Operations Manager for Ringway Jacobs to discuss the ongoing issues. Meanwhile, the *Give Way* signs on the road at The Whalebone have been repainted but we are told there is not sufficient room to safely put up a sign there. Some of the signs have been reinstated and we are advised that the VAS on Chapel Road, first reported by us in July 2022, will be fixed soon.

**Council meetings** We meet on the first Tuesday of each month (apart from August) at 7pm at the village hall. The public are welcome to attend and speak during the public session. The agenda will be on the website and noticeboard a few days before each meeting. The Council are pleased to report that the acoustics in the hall are now much improved, making the sound levels much more comfortable.

**Website** The website has been further updated with news items and information about groups and organizations in the village. If you would like something added, please let the clerk know.


## Fingringhoe Wick Nature Reserve



There is a sense of anticipation in the air as we look forward to welcoming some of our returning summer visitors. The first Spring arrivals are already with us, this migration sometimes referred to the Great Rush North, as birds that overwintered in warmer southern climes, race back northwards to their summer breeding grounds. There is a sense of urgency in the air with the best territories and best mates up for grabs for those first arrivals to stake their claims.

Some species are with us already, including blackcap, chiffchaff and wheatear and we're now waiting for the familiar sights and sounds of the cuckoo, swallow and swift. For us at Fingringhoe that means the nightingale too and we're excited to be welcoming back these little birds soon.

We are fortunate enough to have a one of the largest populations of nightingales in the East of England. Arriving all the way from Africa, these small birds (slightly larger than a sparrow) are famous for their scintillating song, one that has mesmerised people since Roman times. They are rather dull and nondescript to look at, though you won't often see them – not even when you try really hard! – as they like to hide in really dense thick scrub. You will hear them as the males sing for hours and hours, marking their small territories and trying to attract a female.



To experience this amazing wildlife spectacle for yourself, we will be opening the Reserve until 9pm on the following evenings so that you can walk round and listen to these birds yourself: 28 April, 1, 5, 6 and 10 May. Or book a guided tour on 25, 27, 29, 30 April, 2, 4, 9, 11, 13 and 14 May. Keep an eye out for other events on facebook or our website:

## Fingringhoe Ted

Ted was born on 3 July 1982, a gift from my brother on the birth of my first child, a little girl. He sat for many years in the corner of her bedroom and as a baby she would sit on his lap and fall asleep.

During lockdown I was clearing out my loft – as you do – and came across Ted and wasn't sure what to do with him. He was getting on a bit so I decided it would be a great idea to sit him on a bench in the village and put a mask on him with a stethoscope and white T-shirt to hopefully bring a smile to people's faces when they passed on the odd occasion we were allowed out to do our shopping etc. I ordered a NHS banner to say 'Thank you' to all the key workers and this is how it all began.

After a few weeks it seemed a little boring to just leave him in the same outfit so as each month passed I dressed him up appropriately for an occasion during that month. A couple of little friends appeared to join Ted, so I dressed them up as well.

Ted has now been on the bench for about two years and I managed to think of 12 different outfits, but in January 2023 I decided it was best to remove him as he had probably outstayed his welcome. However, to my surprise, posts on the Fingringhoe Village Facebook page started to ask where Ted had gone. So I took him to the launderette for a good clean up and once I had repaired him I put him back on his bench in January and dressed him up for Burns Night.

In November 2022 I made a calendar of Ted's outfits for each month and had 100 printed. There are still some calendars left – available for £4 at the School, the Village Hall, the Community Shop, the Post Office and outside 18 Brook Hall Road. Proceeds go to the School and Pre-School in the village.

I am more than happy to keep Ted going, with his changing outfits – but should you feel that his time on the bench is over then please contact the Parish Council.

## From St Andrew's Church

#### A Time for Reflection

A year has passed since my licensing as Curate-in-Charge of Fingringhoe with East Donyland (or Rowhedge) and Abberton with Langenhoe. By the time you read this it will be spring — that is if you go by the meteorological calendar in which spring begins on 1 March.

When the days get longer and, hopefully, not too much frost is on the ground, in the Church calendar we will be in the season of Lent and you'll probably hear someone say, 'what are you giving up for Lent?' The traditional answer is chocolate, sugar, or beer, with any money saved given to a good cause. Some might even give up their screen time. Lent is a time for self-examination, penitence, self-denial, study, and preparation for Easter. I would just like to reflect on the year gone by before I reflect on any of the above.

I have three churches, St Andrew's, Abberton, St Lawrence's, Rowhedge, and St Andrew's, Fingringhoe. ### Improved audio system

Towards the end of 2022, the Parochial Church Council and the Friends of St Andrew's agreed on joint-funding of a new collaborative project – a major upgrade of the church's audio system, incorporating technological advances since the modest existing kit was installed in 2018.

Local experts Marks Tey Radio were invited to undertake a survey and from this a bespoke package was designed to improve the quality of music and speech reproduction and ease of use.

Installation went ahead over February's half-term holiday week when the church was not in use between one Sunday and the next. The new system has more and larger speakers, giving fuller sound with reduced reverberation.

These have been fitted on the nave and chancel roof beams at a height closer to people's ears than the old ones.

There are three new microphone sockets to provide greater flexibility; two gooseneck floor-stand mics; a mic socket on the pulpit; a wall cabinet containing a more-powerful mixer/amplifier with Bluetooth connectivity, slot-loading CD player and USB connection for direct playback from other audio devices with a headphone socket; and a dual-band equaliser to optimise audio quality. Other features are a larger-size induction Loop amplifier for the benefit of hearing-aid users and rechargeable lapel radio mics.

Taken altogether, the system devised for us by Marks Tey Radio packs a powerful punch and should meet the church's needs for many years to come.

## Fingringhoe Historical Recorders

The Recorders are a group of Fingringhoe residents interested in the history of their village. Since its formation in 1981 the group has been building an archive of material about the people, topography, buildings, activities, industries and events of the village. This includes press cuttings, letters, photographs, posters, trophies, books, maps, drawings and personal accounts that have been donated by villagers over the years. For earlier history the archive also has photocopies of old documents now in the Essex Records Office in Chelmsford, such as census records and old newspapers. The archive is stored in Fingringhoe Village Hall.

In order to make this material more easily accessible to anyone interested in the history of Fingringhoe, the archive has recently been catalogued on computer. Each of over 6,000 items has been numbered, described briefly and scanned or photographed. This database is searchable to make it easier to find items. These files will continue be updated from time to time to include newly-gathered material. This database record is also now freely available via a digital memory stick which can be borrowed from the Recorders (with just a small returnable deposit) to anyone who wishes to review the records.

The recorders are also keen to secure more village records that villagers may have in their personal possession to be copied for the Archive. The group also welcomes new members. For further information, please contact the group by email: fingringhoerecorders@gmail.com
