

Malcolm Hawksby moved to Fingringhoe in 1994. Within two years he became a member of the St Andrew's Church parochial church council. Subsequently he became a churchwarden, a founding member of the Friends of St Andrew's Church and later Benefice Administrator for the three churches in Fingringhoe, Abberton and Rowhedge. I don't think it is possible to over-emphasise the good work Malcolm has done throughout the Benefice, but I know more about his service to St Andrew's Church so will focus on that.

2023 has been a difficult year for Malcolm and he has decided that it is time to resign from all his church-related functions. At a United Benefice service at St Andrew's on Sunday 30 July his 27 years of service were appropriately acknowledged and celebrated.

A churchwarden has broad responsibilities for care of both the fabric of the church and its users. Many will know Malcolm through his warm welcome to regular services, concerts or fundraising events. His leadership at Morning Prayer services has always been greatly appreciated. Many others will know him through the thoughtful advice and support he gave to families preparing for baptism, wedding or funeral services. Most will know of the improvement projects that he co-ordinated, including: major structural repairs, a new heating system, a new kitchen area, a toilet, new lighting and a much-improved sound system. These projects involved hundreds of hours' work, obtaining approval from the church authorities, raising financial support, coordinating design detail with the architect and facilitating the work of the contractors. In addition to these major projects he also made himself available for routine inspections of the church and ongoing maintenance.

Malcolm has always been generous with his time and talent, arriving before everyone else to set up the church and leaving last after clearing up and locking the church. He was frequently to be found doing cleaning work or mowing in the churchyard. Over time, and mostly by default, he also covered the roles of PCC secretary, treasurer,

deanery representative and gift aid officer. Clearly the workload was very heavy.

By nature, Malcolm does everything to a very high standard. He brings to bear a powerful mix of energy, intellect, charm and good humour, and he leaves St Andrew's church, its records and its systems, in much better condition than he found them.

Dear Malcolm, thank you for all that you have done for the church and the community. We wish you a long and happy retirement. We hope that you will continue to worship with us from time to time. And if we are really fortunate you might again lead one of your ever-popular Morning Prayer services.

Change of warden for St Andrew's

When the annual meeting of St Andrew's Parochial Church Council was held at the end of May, members were told of my intention to stand down as churchwarden for Fingringhoe, and administrator for the three churches of our benefice, posts I had held since 2004. How, then, to fill the vacancy for churchwarden, a key office in the church's governing body? Our good fortune was Sheena Taylor's volunteering to stand. She was duly elected by the PCC and later sworn-in by Colchester Archdeacon Ruth Patten on 3 July. (With my departure, the unique, non-PCC role of benefice administrator, created by the late Revd Rhys Martin when he took up his incumbency, is now defunct).

As he closed the annual meeting, Revd Terry Walker said he'd like to give all three parishes the opportunity of acknowledging my time as administrator and suggested the next benefice joint service of Holy Communion, to be hosted by Fingringhoe church on 31 July. 'Absolutely, not, no fuss, please,' I insisted, adding for good measure (and only half in jest) 'I won't turn up.'

Well, my pleas fell on deaf ears. When I stepped into church on Sunday 31 July I found, to my embarrassment, preparations had been made in secret for an after-service 'send-off' with wine, cakes, tributes and gifts. (Think 'surprise!' birthday party).

To be the object of so much kindness, praise and generosity from the many wonderful friends and wellwishers who had gathered from Abberton, Fingringhoe and Rowhedge was a truly humbling experience. Overwhelmed, I failed to express my appreciation



adequately – or even coherently – at the time. Let me now make amends by offering everyone, 'conspirators' and contributors alike, my sincerest, heart-felt appreciation for the tributes, cards and gifts that made the day so special and memorable. Two permanent reminders to be treasured are the beautiful hand-painted Greek Orthodox icons presented to me – one (so aptly chosen) of St Andrew, the other 'The Old Testament Trinity'. Both are now proudly and prominently displayed at home.

While retirement from all my PCC posts releases me to travel new paths at this late stage in life, it isn't intended to signal an end to my associations with the communities of St Andrew's, or Abberton or Rowhedge churches. I've always believed old men should know when the time is right to stand aside and make way for others. Quite simply, that time has come for me. I leave with treasured memories of a fulfilling chapter in my life and the hope of rewarding new challenges and opportunities in the future.

From Fingringhoe Historical Recorders' Archive

Item 0333 of the Archive is one of several records of the activities of churchwardens of the past. In this case, Mr Cooper, churchwarden in 1833, authorises payment of two pounds, seven shillings and sixpence to Joseph Fookes. This recipient belonged to the family of blacksmiths which served the village for many generations. He evidently had regular employment in the church, receiving £2 as half a year's salary. He was also paid for washing the 'surplus' (surplice – the white linen garment worn by priests) and (altar) cloths, a

task that was apparently done every two months. 'Mangling' the laundry refers to the device some of us can still remember, used to squeeze the water out of the washing in the days before spin driers were available.

Garden waste collections 2024 From January 2024, there will be charges for collecting garden waste. The last free collection will be in the week commencing 18 December 2023. This is an 'opt in' service and you can still take your garden waste free of charge to the recycling centres (remember to book a slot); you can also share your garden waste bins (and costs) with your neighbours. The costs from January 2024 will be £30 for each wheelie bin (you can have up to four) and, from April 2024, £55 for the collections plus a £10 sign-up charge, so the first year will cost £95. www.colchester.gov.uk/recycling-and-rubbish/2024garden-waste-collection/

Butterflies play a vital role in our ecosystem. They offer pollination and pest control services, act as food sources for birds and help to brighten our days with their wonderful colour! A 2022 report from Butterfly Conservation concluded that butterflies have declined by 80% in distribution or abundance since the 1970s. To help combat the decline we have launched a campaign called Butterfly Seekers, which has a month to go. Until 30 September we are encouraging everyone to go butterfly seeking and share your sightings with us through an App. Your data will contribute towards creating a county-wide map of butterfly observations, showing what species are found where, allowing us to create specific
